"Prometheus Bound" (Gr: "Prometheus Desmotes") is a tragedy often attributed to the ancient Greek playwright Aeschylus although it is now usually considered to be almost certainly the work of another (unknown) hand, perhaps as late as 415 BCE. It is based on the myth of Prometheus, the Titan who was punished by the god Zeus for giving fire to mankind.

Prometheus Bound also includes two mythic innovations of omission. The first is the absence of Pandora's story in connection with Prometheus' own. Instead, Aeschylus includes this one oblique allusion to Pandora and her jar that contained Hope (252): "[Prometheus] caused blind hopes to live in the hearts of men."

Prometheus Bound was apparently the first play in a trilogy (the other two plays, now lost except for some fragments, were Prometheus Unbound and Prometheus the Fire-Bringer). Although a number of modern scholars have questioned whether Aeschylus was truly the author of the play, it has always been included among his works.

In Prometheus Bound Aeschylus intentionally cultivates an apparently irresolvable conflict between force and intelligence by presenting Prometheus as the powerless but defiant victim of an unjust and powerful god who rules by arbitrary laws and demands blind obedience. 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Aeschylus' Prometheus Bound was the second of a trilogy of plays describing the story of the Titan Prometheus. Aeschylus - Aeschylus - The plays: One of a trilogy of unconnected tragedies presented in 472 bc, Persians (Greek Persai) is unique among surviving tragedies in that it dramatizes recent history rather than events from the distant age of mythical heroes. The play treats the decisive repulse of the Persians from Greece in 480, in particular their defeat at the Battle of Salamis.

All of these plays, with the possible exception of "Prometheus Bound", are known to have taken the first prize at the City Dionysia, which Aeschylus won thirteen times in total. Although "The Oresteia" is the only wholly extant example of a connected trilogy, there is ample evidence that Aeschylus often wrote such trilogies.

Prometheus Bound - Aeschylus Though human tragedy existed long before the works of Sophocles, Aeschylus and Euripides, dramatic tragedy did not. Greek drama was the birthplace of the literary tragedy, using elaborate sets and Greek choruses to fully demonstrate the dramatic impact.
